





Black History Month Celebration 2020 The National Theme: "African Americans and the Vote"

Hear Ye! Hear Ye! The 2020 Celebration of African American History is upon us (February 2020). The Men's Ministry is pleased to announce a month of varied activities designed to ensure a successful outcome as we celebrate African American History Month. The Theme for the month is "African Americans and the Vote". This year's theme highlights this important election year, and marks the 150th Anniversary of the 15th Amendment to the United States Constitution (1870), which gave the right of black men to vote (not black Women) following the Civil War. In this context, each Sunday, Deacon Jerome Stephens and his team, will assist with voter education: registration, poll and voter precinct verification, new voter machine demonstration.

Additional activities include:

- Weekly Black History Moment video presentations will highlight the contributions of selected African American women (Suffragists) who fought for the rights of women in general, and black women to vote.
- Weekly Black History quizzes and crossword puzzles
- A Black History themed movie feature
- On Sunday, 9 February 2020, Pastor Daron Lee, of Agape Outreach Ministries, Warner Robins, Georgia, will deliver the spoken word.

Please join us in the continuing celebration of our history in America.

Adella Hunt Logan,

A Rebellious Black Suffragist



Adella Hunt was born in 1863. She was the daughter of a white planter, Henry Hunt, and a free woman of color, Mariah Hunt. She became certified as a teacher at age 16. She was a native of Sparta, Georgia, and spent most of her life in Georgia. She received her secondary education at Atlanta University and later went on to become a professor at Tuskegee Institute under the leadership of Book T. Washington in 1883. She married Warren Logan in 1888. In the early 1900s, she earned an "Honorary" Master's Degree, because schools for African Americans back then were not accredited to bestow "earned" Graduate Degrees.

She became a charter member of the Tuskegee Woman's Club in 1895 and a member of the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA), who championed the vote for women early in

the 20th century. She attended her first NAWSA convention in 1895 and later became the only African American lifetime member and contributed to the NAWSA's Woman's Journal. Logan was able to attend these white suffrage meetings because she was light enough to "pass" for white. From these meetings, she was able to bring suffrage tactics and materials back to share with people of color. Mrs. Logan encountered many obstacles along her journey, even though she could work along-side white and black women alike. One time in 1900, a white activist friend suggested to Susan B. Anthony, a prominent white suffragist at that time, that Mrs. Logan speak at a convention. Susan B. Anthony rejected that idea by stating, "I cannot have speak for us a woman who has even a ten-thousandth portion of African blood who would be an inferior orator in matter or manner, because it would so mitigate against our cause...Let your Miss Logan wait till she is more cultivated, better educated, and better prepared and can do our mission and her own race the greatest credit." Although this happened, she did not let Mrs. Anthony's, a woman she met five years prior and respected very much because of her suffrage work and ideas, negative words discourage her suffrage work for all women, especially women of color.

Mrs. Logan later went on to publish her views in The Crisis - the NAACP magazine, and The Colored American magazine, which was the country's most widely read journal for, by, and about African Americans. She combined traditional woman suffrage with Black woman suffrage issues. She argued in part, "More and more colored women are participating in civic activities, and women who believe that they need the vote, also see that the vote needs them."

Logan used the arguments of black suffragists of the past, such as Mary Ann Shadd Cary, Frances E. W. Harper, and Sojourner Truth. Once, Adella Hunt Logan wrote to a suffragist leader, "I am working with women who are slow to believe that they will get help from the ballot, but someday I hope to see my daughter vote right here in the South."

Mrs. Logan was unique in that she also argued that the vote would be a protection against the abuse of African American women. Her voice about voting reached a national audience. Hers was the most comprehensive attack by an African American woman on the anti-woman suffrage arguments.







Acts 2:42 – And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread and in prayer.



~ Financial Corner ~

CYCLES, CYCLES

I listen to gospel songs as I drive around town. One that I've heard a lot, resounded with me this week, *Cycles* by Jonathan McReynolds. He sings about how we get caught in cycles and the devil learns from our mistakes, knows our cycles, and uses them to keep us in bondage.

We sometimes get caught in financial cycles. We want to be debt free, but keep charging things. We want to be able to help our family, but we seem to always be the one in need. We ask ourselves why we are always broke.

Let's break these financial cycles. It's February. It's not too late to reset. In addition to being a new year, it's also the beginning of a new decade. What cycles have we been caught in for the past year, decade. Let's look at what we did last year that we would like to leave in 2019.

McReynolds reminds us that there is power in the name of Jesus. So the first things we need to do are pray and ask for help. First, help in identifying what we need to change. Then help with changing that cycle or cycles. What are some cycles we can work on using baby steps?

- a. **Not paying tithes.** One of your New Year's resolutions may have been to start paying tithes, but you can't seem to set the money aside. Well, let's start small with 1% instead of 10 and work our way up.
- b. **Getting out of debt.** Write down or create a spreadsheet of all of your debt. Just take a good look and then try to remember what got you there. If your debt contains credit cards, take note of the interest rates on those cards. You might want to consider consolidating some if you have large balances on high interest cards.

SCAMS:

- a. **IRS** Someone calls from the IRS to tell you they are issuing a warrant for your arrest unless you send them money right away using prepaid cards at Wal-Mart or Walgreens. Government agencies do not call you, nor do they collect using pre-paid cards. Hang up!
- b. **Utility company** Someone calls to tell you they are about to shut off your utilities unless you can send money immediately. If you are behind, you will get a late notice before they shut you off. Also, you have to go pay in person at City Hall or the County.



Union Grove and community of Warner Robins, during the Month of February 2020, Black History Month, we will be registering people to vote and checking to see if you as voters are still in the system to vote in the upcoming elections for 2020. I urge you to check and see if you are in the system.

The voting system of Georgia has been purged and a lot of voters have been dropped from the system, especially, if you have not voted in the last three (3) years. We will be checking on this for you, also.

We will start at 9:00 a.m. each Sunday and will be in the foyer and the annex.

During the course of voting for 2020, dates and times will be posted for our members and community. Super Tuesday will be March 24, 2020 at all precincts. This is a Presidential Election year, however, your local and state elections are just as important.

Absentee Ballots will also be available for those who are 65 and older or disabled. If you are 65 or older or disabled you can have your ballots mailed to your residence.

Remember, people put their lives on the line and died for the privilege to VOTE.

The Board of Elections is going to schedule a demonstration of the new voting machines here at Union Grove during the month of February...stay tuned!

What is the 2020 Census?

The 2020 Census counts the population in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories (Puerto Rico, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands). Each home will



receive an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire—online, by phone, or by mail. The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency.

The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data.

Participating in the census is required by law, even if you recently completed another survey from the Census Bureau. A complete and accurate count is critical for you and your community, because the results of the 2020 Census will affect community funding, congressional representation, and more.

The 2020 Census is easy. You will answer a simple questionnaire about yourself and everyone who is living with you on April 1, 2020.

** Impact in Your Community **

School lunches, Plans for highways, Support for firefighters and families in need. Census results affect your community every day.

The results of the 2020 Census will help determine how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funding flow into communities every year for the next decade. That funding shapes many different aspects of every community, no matter the size, no matter the location.

Did you know that census data helps communities respond to natural disasters and secure funding for hospitals and fire departments?

If you are filling out the census for your home, you should count everyone who is living there as of April 1, 2020. This includes any friends or family members who are living and sleeping there most of the time. If someone is staying in your home on April 1, and has no usual home elsewhere, you should count them in your response to the 2020 Census. Please also be sure to count roommates, young children, newborns, and anyone who is renting a space in your home. These people are often missed in the census. This means they can miss out on resources for themselves and their communities over the next 10 years.

It is important to remember to count any children who are living with you.

This includes:

- All children who live in your home, including foster children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews, and the children of friends (even if they are living with you temporarily).
- Children who split their time between homes, if they are living with you on April 1, 2020.
- Newborn babies, even those who are born on April 1, 2020, or who are still in the hospital on this date.

The 2020 Census will provide a snapshot of our nation - who we are, where we live, and so much more. The results of this once-a-decade count determine the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives. They are also used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

Each year, Census data informs federal funding for more than 100 programs, including school lunches, highway construction, and education.

The 2020 Census will be valuable to businesses, as the results will provide a rich set of data on the communities they serve, including population trends and growth projections.

Business owners rely on census results to make decisions, such as where to open new stores, restaurants, factories, or offices, where to expand operations, where to recruit employees, and which products and services to offer.

** Avoiding Scams Online **

Phishing is a criminal act in which someone tries to get your information by pretending to be an entity that you trust. Phishing e-mails often direct you to a website that looks real but is fake - and may be infected with malware.

It is important to know that the Census Bureau will not send unsolicited e-mails to request your participation in the 2020 Census. Further, during the 2020 Census, the Census Bureau will never ask for:

- Your Social Security number.
- Your bank account or credit card numbers.
- Money or donations.



In addition, the Census Bureau will not contact you on behalf of a political party.

** Staying Safe at Home **

If someone visits your home to collect a response for the 2020 Census, you can do the following to verify their identity:

- First, check to make sure that they have a valid ID badge, with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date.
- If you still have questions about their identity, you can call <u>800-923-8282</u> to speak with a local Census Bureau representative.


** Reporting Suspected Fraud **

If you suspect fraud, call <u>800-923-8282</u> to speak with a local Census Bureau representative. If it is determined that the visitor who came to your door does not work for the Census Bureau, contact your local police department.




Security Ministry

As we celebrate "love day" on February 14, I asked a minister friend of mine to give me some ideas to write about concerning showing love as a Christian. Minister James Davis, a graduate of New York Theological Seminary told me about the 4 types of love:

The first type is **Eros**, affectionate, romantic love. Eros is the word often used to express love that is shared between people who are physically attracted to one another. Eros is used in the Old Testament to express the love between a husband and a wife.

The next kind of love, <u>storgē</u>, is one of affection or belonging. It's the kind of love we have for our relatives, simply because they're family. This type is shown between a mother and a father and his/her children. Likewise. children will demonstrate the love they have for their parents.

The third type of love he told me about is **philo**, the love of friendship or companionship. Phileo refers to brotherly love and is most often exhibited in a close friendship. Best friends will display this generous and affectionate love for each other as each seeks to make the other happy. This love might be demonstrated with terms such a buddies, BFFs or "my sister from another mister". True friendship will last over many years.

Since phileo love involves feelings of warmth and affection toward another person, we do not have phileo love toward our enemies. However, God commands us to have agape love toward everyone. As stated in Matthew 5:44: "But I say to you "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you".

God commands us to show the next type of love: agape.

This fourth love, <u>agape</u> is the highest of all the love. This is divine love. Agape speaks of the most powerful, noblest type of love: sacrificial love.

This is what Jesus demonstrated on the cross for us by sacrificing his life and taking on the entire burden of sin for all mankind so that we could have life everlasting with Him in Heaven.


As I stated in my introductory paragraph we celebrate February 14 as the day we show love. We, however, as Christians should show love all days and in all ways.


